1. Welcome, Introduction & Norms: ☐ Norms of JRM SAC meetings

<u>School Advisory Councils (SACs)</u> are formal structures created by the School District of Philadelphia to provide an avenue for partnership and collaboration. A School Advisory Council (SAC) is a peer-elected, collaborative team that works to improve student achievement, effective teaching in the classroom, and parent and community engagement in the educational process.

Masterman's SAC is composed of the school principal, eight elected family members, five teachers, and two students - one HS and one MS representative. We also include HS Student Government Association (SGA) student leaders as part of the SAC. Masterman SAC is governed by <u>JRM SAC By-Laws</u>. SAC's get their mandate from the School District of Philadelphia's Board of Education Resolution - <u>SDP BoE 920 Policy</u>.

## 2. Facilities Update:

Check if anyone from the facilities office is attending the SAC meeting and offer them a forum for updates. Thank you to the District Facilities department for their continued engagement in our community and their partnership.

- Latest asbestos update: AHERA inspections and documentation
- Repairing peeling paint on rooftop outstanding since fall of 2024 the roof is slippery when wet on the
  painted areas and there is also some pooling on the roof. Roof was replaced in 2023 as part of a capital
  project.
- Bathroom/sanitation issues Impact of over-enrollment, need for more sanitation staff.
- Masterman building upgrade from Grp 3 to Grp 4 process for review
- Regular facilities update: Have water fountains, air conditioners, <u>air purifiers</u> been serviced with appropriate filter replacements?
- Deputy Sup. Operations Oz Hill recognized the national ranking of the school.
- Dr. Kahlila Johnson (Deputy Chief/Talent) discussed vacant math position (sabbatical). Noted that the position has been filled on 9/8 and will co-teach with other teachers. Will cover Grade 7 and geometry. 9/18 will begin lead teaching. Requested that the principal provide the new hire with a mentor (Mr. Tannen).
  - The facilitator noted that there was a hiring freeze on this position and that this position was re-opened after the start of the school year. Dr. Johnson acknowledged the issue and stated that all parties and stakeholders are involved to discuss vacancies in the future to ensure that positions are filled in a timely manner. Dr. Tomas Hanna noted a 70% decrease in the teacher pool. Noted similar teacher vacancy issues in other schools.
  - A 7th parent noted that their child experienced teacher vacancies during their time at the school, and reiterated the need for the timely resolution of teacher vacancies.
- Parents noted that 5th graders are not using the bathroom due to potential facilities issues.
- A parent noted issues with the rooftop paint. They noted that this has been an ongoing issue, and that it was addressed during SAC meetings last year. They stated that Mr. Gilken noted that access during recess has been restricted due to safety issues surrounding the paint. During the meeting, Mr. Gilken asked if the paint may be removed entirely, thus allowing for more access days.
  - Deputy Chief Vern Palmer stated that they escalated this concern. Mr. Tom Sharer noted that they have a vendor but need 7 days to scrap and prep the area for paint removal.
     Requested dates from the principal and the District will provide a project plan.
- A parent noted that the school's facility team is doing a great job but that they require additional staff due to the additional number of students (1200+ students).
  - Tom Sharer noted that additional staffing has begun on 9/8, and adjusted work hours. Noted the school is short one evening staff member.
- Asbestos: the principal will check with Oz Hill on the status of the latest inspection. A parent asked if the asbestos reports may be posted on the school's website.

**HS PICNIC:** Von Colln Park: **Parent Chaperones needed** from 10 am to 2:45 pm - at least 40 needed. This is a decades-old school tradition and cannot happen without parent participation. MS and HS parents are welcome to chaperone. <u>Parent Volunteer Interest Form for SGA HS Fall Picnic</u>

## i. Teachers and Staffing Update

- 7th Grade Math Ms. Geiger

- 10th Grade Geometry will be taught by Mr. Lam and Ms. Burge, who are both experienced Geometry teachers here at Masterman.
- To provide consistency and coverage, Geometry sections will be combined into one class. Mr. Lam and Ms. Burge will rotate instructional responsibilities and collaborate on pacing, assessments, and assignments.
- Once each week, Ms. Shapiro will supervise the combined Geometry class. During these sessions, students will engage in meaningful extension activities designed to deepen their understanding of concepts and strengthen problem-solving skills.
- This approach allows us to maintain rigor while also ensuring all students benefit from shared expertise and additional enrichment opportunities.
- How many extra resources did we get because of the over-enrollment? Counselor, extra position (grade level teacher)
- Onboarding of new teachers: Ms. Graham leads the cohort of new staff, and we have monthly meetings to discuss logistics Google Classroom access, grading portal access etc.

- Each 5th-grade section has seven specials (1.5 Periods of Art, 2 Periods of Music, 1 Period of PE, 1 Digital Literacy, 1 English Enrichment, .5 Math Enrichment). Any inequity will be resolved after the semester rotation.
- 6th-Grade: 2 Periods of Art, 1 Period of Digital Literacy, 2 Periods of Music, 2
   Periods of PE
- 7th-Grade: 2 Periods of Art, 1 Period of Digital Literacy, 1.5 Periods of Music, 1.5
   Periods of Math Enrichment, 2 Periods of PE
- 8th-Grade: 1 Period PE, 1 Period of Art, 2 Periods of Music, 1 Period of English Enrichment
- How is the language rostered to accommodate 1st-year language students in 9th? Preference was asked and split between French 1 and Spanish 1.
  - The principal will look into external educational options to accommodate incoming students to avoid crowding and scheduling issues.
- Are they rostered with 8th graders? No
- How many sections of Language 1 are in Spanish and French? One of each
- How are 7th graders who took Algebra I Studies last year rostered for Algebra 2 this year? How
  many students? Only four students, rostered with 9th-grade Algebra 2
- The principal noted that there are enough rooms for instruction, so the cafeteria and auditorium are not used for instructional spaces. The principal will discuss with the district on future enrollment numbers and impact on facility and teacher morale.
- The principal discussed the accelerated math pathways for 7th grade, and the introduction of French and Spanish so that they make a more informed choice for Language.
- The principal will discuss with Ms. Harrison on having the FACE representative share how to access their student's information on Infinite Campus.

## iv. Academics

- Syllabus, grading policy and weightage, expectations of when work will be posted and when it needs to

- If the current school is ranked anything other than #1, but NO OFFERS ARE RECEIVED from a higher ranked school, they will receive an offer from the current school. All lower ranked choices will be automatically declined. The student will remain on the waitlist for any higher ranked choices for which they are eligible.
- Noted the importance of the Pathways as it builds community.

## 2026–2027 School Year Updates

**Sibling Preference** has been expanded to include siblings/twins who are applying to the same catchment or city-wide school.

## **Criteria-Based High Schools**

Each of these schools has its own set of admissions criteria related to attendance, grades, and standardized test scores. Students citywide may apply to these schools but must meet the criteria to be considered for admission.

## **City-Wide High Schools**

These schools accept students from across the city. City-wide schools do not have admission criteria and interested students are selected through an impartial lottery process.

## **Catchment High Schools**

These schools have an open admissions policy (no criteria) for students who have attended grade eight in the school's feeder pattern. The schools that the child attends within a certain feeder patter is based on the family's home address. Students outside the catchment are still able to apply through the selection process.

## **About the Criteria**

Criteria-based schools will review a student's grades, attendance, and standardized assessment scores (PSSA test scores, or an approved alternative)\*. Some notes on these criteria:

All schools will accept the best grades and attendance rates from the previous two school years

- Grade requirements are for the 4 core subjects: ELA, Math, Science and Social Studies
- Attendance requirements: 95% attendance rate is 9 or fewer unexcused absences. 90% attendance rate is 18 or fewer unexcused absences.
- Assessment Requirements:
  - Students applying to 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th grades, all schools will accept the best assessment percentiles from the previous two school years
  - For students applying to 5th grade, schools will only use the previous year's assessment percentiles
  - o For students applying to 11th & 12th grade, standardized assessment percentiles will not be reviewed

We need Algebra 2 reg for 10th and Lang 1 too.

\*Please note: Some schools may also have additional requirements that may include auditions or project submissions.

   We haven't accepted students from the waitlist into 10th Grade and do not plan to.

  - In the future communication from school regarding how to let the school know that lateness is due to Septa? From Monday, September 15, SEPTA is fully funded and will resume its schedule - we don't anticipate significant disruptions moving forward
